Statement of intent

At Alverstoke Infant School we offer additional support for children whose parents are in the armed forces as we recognise that their school experience can be different from their civilian peers. Families can be posted several times over a child's school life and this can mean a massive change for the child and family. Children can be affected when a parent is deployed for a length of time.

In order to support families and children our school ELSA is available to help with any anxieties or questions. She is a key link for families affected and champions opportunities for children to be together with other children with the same life experiences as themselves. She may also run parent coffee meetings so parents can socialise and share any information or ask questions.

Activity	Intended impact
Half termly Service Club	Children will have regular opportunities to meet with other children from Service families, sharing their experiences and forming a school community together.
Regular ELSA support for pupils	Children will have the opportunity to talk about their worries and feelings with one of our school ELSAs.
Targeted support for children with deployed parents.	Staff will support children to communicate with their deployed parent via email and will respond to changing situations re: sudden deployment.
Recognition of Month of the Military Child – Day of celebration with visiting parents	Children who have military parents will be able to share their experiences with their peers. Children will learn about different family situations, careers and develop an understanding of the impact having a deployed parent has on their peers, and how they can support them.
